# **Carolina Trace cemeteries explored by local historian**

SANFORD — Cemeteries, as any historian worth his or her salt knows, are full of old ghosts. Finding those "ghosts" — and the stories they have to tell — can be a historian's dream.

It can also lead to awards, as local history buff John Altenburger found out recently.


Altenburger was given the Willie Parker Peace History Book Award by the North Carolina Society of Historians in November for research he did while putting together a book about five cemeteries in Carolina Trace.

"I've been into genealogy for a long time," Altenburger said. "And a real pain is going to a cemetery and looking and not knowing if anything is there or not." For that reason, Altenburger set out to make an index — what he called a "genealogist's tool" — of who's buried in five cemeteries within the boundaries of Carolina Trace.

The result was a ring-binder filled with computer-generated reproductions of each cemetery as well as an alphabetical index of the people who inhabit them.

Altenburger used skills he learned in two semesters at Central Carolina Community College's drafting program to create his graphics. On each graphic is a representation of the location and shape of each stone in each cemetery. Further graphics provide what is written on each stone as well as other things in the cemeteries, such as foot markers and metal pegs on

Continued from Pg. **1A** which to place pictures or flowers.

The book also contains maps of Carolina Trace, marking each cemetery's location. He used a mapping program provided by the Sanford Fire Department.

Altenburger's book was donated to the Lee County Public Library.

At the urging of the library Director Mike Matochik and local historian James Vann Comer, Altenburger sent a copy of the book to the North Carolina Society of Historians in April.

Later he found out he had won the award. The judges commented, "The author/researcher has utilized his computer skills to produce the most incredible work we have seen thus far as judges. The presentation is innovative and thrilling."

The five cemeteries Altenburger researched were the Gilmore Cemetery, the Wicker Cemetery, the Hawley-Brooks Cemetery, the Gaster Cemetery, and the Cox Cemetery, also known as the Dodd-Cox Graveyard.

Each cemetery varies in size and age.

The Gilmore Cemetery is in the middle of Carolina Trace's golf course. A small fenced in area a few feet off the second tee, it contains seven graves and dates back as far as 1912. The most recent burial there was in 1961. The Wicker Cemetery is on a traffic island at Trace. It was used between 1916 and 1950.

The Cox Cemetery, which is also known as the Dodd-Cox Graveyard, is located on the eastern edge of Trace, in the forest about 125 yards off Cox Mill Road.

"It's not on a road," Altenburger said. "You have to know about this one."

Altenburger said he learned about the Cox Cemetery by reading a history of Carolina Trace. The cemetery dates back to 1873.

The least known burial area was the Hawley-Brooks Cemetery, Altenburger said. Not so much a cemetery as a family burial plot, only two people are buried there. It is deep in the woods and dates back to 1859.

"I was talking to a buddy of mine who knew it was back there," Altenburger said.

The biggest cemetery in the area is the Gaster Cemetery. It goes back as far as 1859 and can be seen from the main road.


Altenburger is passionate about not only history in general, but especially the history of this area.

"Cox, Wicker, Gaster. These are common names in Sanford. I teach at CCCC and my students have these names," Altenburger said. "And most of them don't know their own heritage. It's a shame."

Anyone interested in seeing Altenburger's work can view it at the Lee County library.





Hawley/Brooks Burial Plot Carolina Trace Off of the Lake 3 Course Fairway in heavy woods. Indian Trail is the closest road.



Note-The large tombstone is tipped and off the base.




Gilmore Cemetery - Carolina Trace at the Creek Course No. 2 tee (about 40 feet x 30 feet)
